The cycle C readings today at our <u>5:30p & 11:30a Masses</u> remind us that we are fortunate to be alive for this blessed season of Lent. Why? Because it means we still have the opportunity to repent of our sins and to turn back to God with our whole hearts. We all sin; it is the human condition. But with hearts in the right place, we feel remorse for our sins and we promise God, others, and ourselves to do better. How lucky we are that we can! As we continue through this holy season, let us make the most of this opportunity.



As we approach the day when our Elect will be baptized, confirmed and receive the Eucharist for the first time, we celebrate three Scrutiny Sundays. The rites are centered on the Elect, but they need to involve the wider community.

This weekend, the **1st Scrutiny is at the 8:30a Mass**. At the Scrutiny Mass, we use the cycle A readings. The first reading reminds us of the power of water for without water the Chosen People would have died of thirst in the desert. Moses brings forth water from a rock, revealing God's constant presence and care. In the Gospel story of the women at the well, Jesus reveals Himself as the source of living water, water that will well up in us to eternal life.

The three Scrutinies are celebrated on the third, fourth, and fifth Sundays of Lent and are a series of rites for those to be baptized at the Easter Vigil. This is considered a period of purification and enlightenment for the Elect. There are prayers of exorcism which are intended to help purify them from sin and sinful desires. The overall prayers and laying on of hands are to help them be enlightened by the Word and grace of God. These are important foundational teachings for the Elect to understand and experience. During the three-week period of the Scrutinies, the Elect open the eyes of their souls, examine carefully how sin works in their lives, and make the deliberate choice to turn away from sin so they can step joyfully into the light of Christ at their Baptism.

The Scrutinies are associated with three specific Gospel stories on these three weekends of Lent:

- Jesus encountering the Samaritan woman at the well, where He offers Himself as the living Water;
- Jesus healing the man born blind, where He gives Himself as the Light of the World; and
- Jesus raising Lazarus form the dead, where He reveals Himself as the Resurrection and the Life.

A Message from Father Tom...


Depending on which Mass you attend, you'll have "A" cycle readings or "C" cycle readings.

In the "C" cycle, we hear something at the crux of Lent: with intention towards the good followed by repentance, those who have been astray can return. It often takes a moment of critical choice to know and understand that there's a need for change. We don't have perfect knowledge at all times, and so we review ourselves and our circumstances again and again so as to help course-correct our lives back onto the path of holiness.

Our Elect (formerly Catechumens) begin three weekends of Scrutinies, which assist them in their purification and enlightenment in preparation for the Easter sacraments. They will be interrogated, exorcised, and we'll pray for them that they can prepare worthily and adequately. That intention is a reminder for us of the constant vigilance we must live-in towards rejecting evil and amending our lives.


Brother Guy Consolmagno, SJ Director of the Vatican Observatory here Monday, March 24






